Read Daniel 1:1-10

How does Daniel's request to the chief official resonate with what Doug was preaching on Sunday?

How can we be encouraged by Daniel's act of faith?

The Hebraic name for Daniel is *God is my judge*. Daniel was one of several Israelites called by king Nebuchadnezzar, to come under training only to be indoctrinated, or brainwashed, into his customs. The king would wine and dine these men with earthly royalty to sway them into abandoning their Jewish custom and traditions, and ultimately worship him. However, Daniel - living up to the Hebraic meaning of his name, made a fascinating request in the midst of comfort and flattery. Daniel requested to the chief official that he not indulge in the luxurious food and wine, in order that he not defile himself. Daniel chose to remain faithful to God – Yahweh by sticking to the traditions that maybe weren't as glamorous as what the king was offering.

Much like Daniel's situation, as Christians today – we too have a choice whether we remain faithful to Jesus or give into what the world is selling us. We can make the decision of who or what will be discipling us every day: Jesus or culture. Are we peacefully pleasing God or striving to please man? Are we looking for validation in man's approval or remaining confident in God's already approval?

The response from the chief official shows that when we care more about the opinions of man, we become slaves to fear. However, when we rest on our identity in Jesus, we then have the ability to set others free.

What is one area in your life that you can cease striving for man's approval and rest on God's approval?

By doing that, how can that be more impactful on your life daily?
