Romans 3:21-31

What do you know about the book of Romans? What message do you think Paul is trying to communicate in this passage?

How does this passage resonate with Ethan's message from Sunday?

Paul the apostle, formerly named Saul who murdered and persecuted Christians, became the face of church planting during the early church days. This same felon also wrote, most scholars believe, thirteen of the books in the New Testament. We still read and quote his words every day!

How does Paul, the author of Romans, go from murdering to preaching? The answer is the deep grace of God who transforms us from the inside out. The grace that God has for us because He's not merely interested in our behavior but our hearts. He'd rather have us at all costs to set us free from something to set us free to something.

The grace given to us by God is through the accomplished work on the cross through Jesus. Our righteousness is credited to us not by works, but by faith. Only the man who once murdered people for a living would be able to remind us of that in this passage. Receiving what was undeserving and experiencing the depth of His love would turn him into a radical disciple of Jesus.

Paul is a Believer's great example of what God's grace can do to and for us when we allow it. Paul's life and ministry proved the Gospel to be true since he never walked side by side with Jesus in the flesh; only in and by the Spirit did Paul live his life. Through Paul's testimony, we can be encouraged that Jesus is enough and that His grace is freely given even on our worst days. If not Paul, then trust the words of Jesus through the parable of the prodigal son.

Read John 1:15-18

What's your takeaway from this passage?

How does verse 16 continue to resonate deeper with Ethan's message on grace?

John the Baptist, Jesus's cousin, had a purpose and mission to lay the groundwork of the kingdom prior to Jesus's ministry arrival. He preached on what was to come and baptized into what was about to be. Though others started to consider him the Messiah, John was quick to correct and point to someone greater than he. Someone who'd manifest the Word into flesh full of both *grace* and truth.

The Old Testament shows us the story of humans failing at keeping the law which ultimately kept them further from God. The New Testament shows us God's plan to reconcile us back to Him in full completion. Jesus was always the plan after Adam and Even's mishap in the garden, setting us free from the burden of keeping in step with the law. Freedom was God's idea that we would live fully and abundantly in Jesus, having a full relationship with our Creator.

Because of the cross, we can boldly approach God's throne on our worst day as we can our best day. Jesus paying the penalty and becoming the ultimate sacrifice, bridged the gap between us and God. Through faith we can experience His grace as we are now seen by the righteousness clothed on us by Jesus's blood. We are no longer defined or known by our sin because that yoke was broken on Good Friday. Knowing and experiencing this gift propels us to keep walking in freedom on our worst days in our biggest mistakes just as we do on our best days.
